Hired to take Rowan to "the next level." Accomplishments include:

- Elevating Rowan from second tier to top tier, from 55<sup>th</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> among both public and private campuses, and from below the top ten to 3<sup>rd</sup> among public institutions in the northern region in *U.S. News and World Report*.
- Personally soliciting eight gifts in excess of \$1 million, and two in excess of \$10 million, and leading Rowan's first capital campaign (target: \$22 million; received: \$27 million).
- Increasing freshman applications by more than 60%, to more than 8,600, for 1500 freshman seats, and improving median SAT scores of admitted students to 1170.
- Increasing freshman to sophomore retention rates to almost 90%, and six-year graduation rates of 75%.

- Creating new public-private partnerships to bring athletic venues to campus with minimal financial contribution by the campus.

- Being the first campus president in New Jersey to sign the Presidents' Climate Commitment; 8 major environmental awards to date; a plan for a zero carbon campus footprint by 2027; and LEED certification of all future building projects.
- Creating a separate Division of Student Affairs, with two major subdivisions: Residential Learning and Student Engagement.
- Changing the campus culture from one of dependence on state resources to one that embraces entrepreneurialism.
- Overseeing the creation of an allopathic medical school in a partnership with Cooper University Hospital (Camden, NJ), the first allopathic medical school to be established in the State of New Jersey in over 30 years), and the first medical school in South Jersey.
