CURRICULUM

Structure

The program leading to a *Bachelor of Arts* in Art and Architectural History is a 12-course, 36-credit major. The curriculum includes:

- Two introductory courses covering art and architecture from ancient times through the 20th century
- Seven intermediate courses, ranging from The History and Theory of Photography to History of Landscape Architecture
- Two advanced seminars, with options like "The Skyscraper" and "Nature and Art"
- A senior seminar or thesis that explores a topic of interest in depth
- Two optional courses of foreign language study

This flexible program is tailored to the particular interests and goals of each student. You also have the option to develop a six-course concentration in either Art History or Architectural History.
