Participate in Social Justice Education

Cultural Studies focuses on social justice. Both in and outside your classes, you will seek to understand oppression and equity. You will study gender, sexuality, race, and the many ways they intersect. Whether it's a teach-in on successful student-led protests throughout history, a civil disobedience training, an immersive internship experience, or a class on resisting oppression, this program provides context and inspiration for making meaningful change.

Study Abroad

Cultural Studies majors enjoy various opportunities to live, work, and study abroad. You may pursue a semester-long program, take a short-term course like Americans in Paris or Social Justice in Hispaniola, or work with the Foundation for the International Medical Relief for Children (FIRMC), an organization that offers free medical care to children and mothers. Traveling outside the United States gives you a deeper understanding of culture, language, identity, and society.

CURRICULUM

Faculty

Our faculty have expertise in subjects like immigration history, queer and feminist studies, and pop culture. Cultural Studies majors have freedom to pursue their specific interests within the program. Students receive individualized guidance according to their specializations, and mentorship that supports their learning and career paths post-graduation. Cultural Studies classes are made up of small group discussions, community engaged projects, and lectures, giving students the opportunity to learn in the ways that best suit them.

Structure

Majors complete 3 foundation courses. Then, they take courses in the topic areas of race, gender and sexuality in America, ethnicity, class and region in America, American material and popular culture, and American ideas and institutions. Together, with Cultural Studies faculty, they choose a specific program of study and take four interdisciplinary electives from related disciplines such as Art and Architectural History, Architecture, English, History, Music, Philosophy, and Political Science. Majors are encouraged to apply electives toward a minor or second major.

Special Courses

The program offers a number of exciting courses that connect what students are seeing, hearing, and experiencing in their daily lives and in pop culture to the larger American society. Examples include:

- Queer and Trans Lives in America
- Superheroes/heroines in American Popular Culture
